- Neue Medien: Digitale Kunst, Videoarbeiten und interaktive Installationen, die den technologischen Wandel widerspiegeln.
- Grafik und Drucke: Eine umfangreiche Sammlung von Drucken und Grafiken, die das kreative Spektrum der Künstler erweitern.

Highlights der Sammlung

- Cy Twombly: Der amerikanische Künstler ist mit zahlreichen seiner ikonischen Werke vertreten, die seine charakteristische Handschrift und seine Liebe zur Mythologie zeigen.
- Jean-Michel Basquiat: Seine kraftvollen, rauen Gemälde sind zentrale Bestandteile der Sammlung und spiegeln seine kritische Haltung gegenüber Gesellschaft und Macht wider.
- Keith Haring: Seine bunten, grafischen Werke sind ein Markenzeichen der Pop Art und finden sich in der Sammlung in verschiedenen Formaten.
- Gerhard Richter: Mit seinen vielfältigen stilistischen Ansätzen bereichert er die Sammlung maßgeblich, von fotorealistischen Gemälden bis hin zu abstrakten Arbeiten.

Sonderausstellungen und Erweiterungen

Neben der dauerhaften Sammlung präsentiert das Museum regelmäßig Sonderausstellungen, die aktuelle Tendenzen der Kunstszene aufgreifen. Diese Ausstellungen fördern den Austausch zwischen etablierten Künstlern und Nachwuchstalenten und beleuchten gesellschaftliche Themen wie Digitalisierung, Umwelt oder politische Bewegungen.

Das Bildungs- und Kulturprogramm

Vermittlungsangebote

Das Museum Brandhorst legt großen Wert auf Bildungsarbeit und kulturelle Vermittlung. Es bietet:

- Führungen: Für Schulklassen, Familien und Fachpublikum.
- Workshops: Für Jugendliche und Erwachsene, um kreative Prozesse zu fördern.
- Vorträge und Diskussionsrunden: Mit Künstlern, Kuratoren und Wissenschaftlern.

Kooperationen und Veranstaltungen

Das Museum arbeitet eng mit Universitäten, Kunsthochschulen und anderen kulturellen Institutionen zusammen. Zudem finden regelmäßig Veranstaltungen wie Konzerte, Filmabende und Performances statt, um das Programm vielfältig und lebendig zu gestalten.
